## Ponderings

## by the Senior Pastor



Dear Church Family,

Since January, there has been a small team of leaders from both the Manassas Campus and the Haymarket Campus working behind the scenes to discern the best future for both campuses going forward. This team is called the Campus Partnership Team (CPT) and includes Abi Foerster, Brian Johnson, Pat Dodson, Josh Thom, Bill Bixby, Tim Grembowski, Don Rickerson, Kevin Wolf, Deb Crawford, Eric Luetkenhaus and Michelle Lebowitz. Also, supporting this work together have been several stakeholders at the District and Conference levels including Jeff Mickle (District Superintendent), Mark Ogren (Director of Congregational Excellence for the Annual Conference) and Jim Chandler (Church Planting Coach).

On April 30, Pastor Brian and Lay Leader, Josh Thom, shared with the congregation their sense of where God is calling the Haymarket Campus, including the untethering of Haymarket from the Manassas Campus. This is a critical decision for both campuses but is ultimately guided by the question, "Will each campus be more effective in reaching more people with the gospel of Jesus Christ if they are untethered?" In the past few months, through intense prayer and crucial conversations the CPT feels that the answer is a resounding "Yes!"

During the months of May and June both leadership teams submitted plans for what this untethering might look like to address timelines, financial support, staffing, etc. On July 10, the District Superintendent joined the work of the CPT as a facilitator and together we arrived at a 3 ½ year plan that all agreed upon. Below are the key highlights of this plan:

Start-Date of Plan: January 1, 2019 Proposed Launch Date: July 1, 2022

### **Key Metrics and Financial Support:**

Average Worship Attendance:

Baseline average: 79, as of June 2019 July 2019- June 2020: from 80 to 85 July 2020-June 2021: from 85 to 100 July 2021-June 2022: from 100 to 120

• Financial Support (Haymarket Campus Offerings):

July 2019-June 2020: \$160,000 July 2020-June 2021: \$185,000 July 2021-June 2022: \$210,000

• Financial Support (Manassas Campus Offerings):

2019: \$75,000 2020: \$40,000 2021: \$20,000

Jan-June 2022: \$5,000

The current members of the CPT all agreed to continue serving on the team until the Haymarket Campus launches successfully and to meet a minimum of twice a year for accountability and conversation. Furthermore, to align with the appointment process and the current terms of the office lease and/ or rental arrangements, the CPT would review viability at the earliest in December 2020 and then again in December 2021. It was felt that the Haymarket Campus needed the remainder of 2019 and all of 2020 to have time to settle into their new worship location and have time to put all portions of their internal growth plans into effect. The recent change in the worship site coupled with the move of their administrative offices and the construction detours in their new area are all being factored into the agreement that this transition will take a little time to see positive results.

It was also agreed that the financial support noted above from Manassas is an "up to" amount for each calendar

year. The amounts are the maximum amounts of financial support Haymarket can expect to receive from Manassas. Should Haymarket's financial giving exceed their goal by a significant amount, then the support from Manassas would decrease proportionally within that same period. In other words, the goal is for Haymarket's offerings to cover their expenses; by providing an "up to" amount, Manassas is serving as a safety net as the Haymarket Campus works towards independence. Last but not least, it was agreed upon that Haymarket will obtain their own bank account by January 1, 2020 and then identify a volunteer or paid bookkeeper/accountant to record and report on their finances to the Church Council as they work towards launching.

As you can see, a lot of work is reflected in this brief summary and clearly, launching a new community of faith is not for the faint of heart! However, the Manassas Campus has faithfully and sacrificially given financial and human resources since 2007 to help birth a new congregation in the Haymarket community. We can be proud of this support and the many lives that have come to know Christ because of our combined efforts at both campuses! If you have further questions or comments, please don't hesitate to contact me. I am truly excited to see what the future holds and trust that God's spirit is fervently working through us to accomplish his plan.

## Haymarket Church Update - Rev. Brian Johnson

It is an exciting time at Haymarket Church, the Haymarket Campus of St. Thomas United Methodist Church.

In September, Haymarket Church entered into a season of what is called "breakthrough prayer." At the time, our Leadership Team felt like we were stuck in neutral – like there were opportunities in front of us, but we just couldn't grasp them, we just couldn't see where God was calling us to go next. So, we decided to ask God to show us the way – to take us where we need to go, even if we couldn't see the path there for ourselves. Since then, every Sunday in worship we have prayed the same breakthrough prayer. Many of us have been praying it daily as well – once in the morning and once at night – asking God to help us take our next steps. Here's the prayer we've been praying:

God, we lift Haymarket Church to you. Help us to reach new people with the power of your love. We ask that you would give our church the resources, including the financial resources, to take our next steps in faith. We pray that your Holy Spirit would come and breakthrough in these areas in a way that we have not been able. Please work through us to do what we cannot do alone. Change what we cannot change ourselves, including changing us. We pray your power and glory be at work here—without limits. In Jesus' name, Amen.

In the months since we began praying that prayer, it feels as if God has given us a new vision of what's possible in ministry out here in Haymarket – and God has been opening all sorts of doors to help make that vision a reality.

In the past few months, so much has changed at Haymarket Church, and it feels like God is making this change happen. For one, we've moved our worship location. As of the end of June, we no longer worship at Gravely Elementary School. As of July 7, our new worship location is Haymarket Elementary School. There are a lot of reasons for this change – we have a great relationship with the faculty and administration at Haymarket Elementary, it's in the middle of a new neighborhood (with lots of opportunities to reach new people), once a

new road is completed, this locations means that it will be much easier to get to us on Sunday morning – but the primary reason for this move is that we believe God is



calling us to go to this new place, and we are excited to follow where God leads. As we prayed,

this new location kind of just fell into our laps. We believe that there is huge opportunity to do God's work in new ways in this new worship location, and we're excited to be part of it!

In addition, at the end of May we moved out of our office space at the Old Bank Building and moved into new office space on the second floor of the Haymarket Town Hall building. This move will save us more than \$3000 per month – a huge step for us – AND it will still give us a great facility to support our various ministries. Again, this opportunity kind of just fell into our laps, and we believe that it is God moving us forward towards where we are called to go next.

Beyond these recent changes, this summer is just full of a lot of excitement! We sent a youth mission team (17 teenagers, 7 adults) on a mission trip to Nashville. We are hosting 175 kids and about 50 volunteers for Vacation Bible School(VBS). About half of the kids involved in our VBS don't have a home church – which means that this is a significant opportunity to reach families who are not otherwise experiencing the Good News of Jesus in a church setting. We are making new connections, building new relationships, reaching new people, and putting God's love into action in awesome ways. We are really excited about the work God is doing in our community and through our church!

In addition to the exciting things happening this summer, Haymarket Church is entering into a season of transition. A few months ago, leaders from Haymarket Church (including me) came to a Tuesday Night worship service and gave a presentation on the dream that God has given us — a dream for Haymarket Church to launch as an independent, self-sufficient, United Methodist Church — no longer dependent upon or tied to St. Thomas UMC. After that presentation, we heard a ton of positive response and encouragement from the people of the Manassas Campus of St. Thomas — and we are deeply thankful for your support. The people of St. Thomas have birthed something new in Haymarket, and we are reaching new people in that community in some really exciting ways. As we have listened to God during this season of prayer, we believe that launching as an independent United Methodist Church is our next faithful step. And we have heard back from the people of the Manassas Campus that you are excited about and supportive of that plan.

Since that presentation, leaders from Haymarket Church and from the Manassas Campus of St. Thomas have been meeting together in what we are calling the Campus Partnership Team. This team has been tasked with turning that dream — of Haymarket Church launching as an independent, self-sustaining, United Methodist Church, no longer a part of St. Thomas — into a reality. The members of that team are Pat Dodson, Don Rickerson, Bill Bixby, Deb Crawford, Abi Foerster, Michelle Lebowitz, Tim Grembowski, Josh Thom, Kevin Wolf, Eric Leutkenhaus, and Brian Johnson. In early July, that team sat down and crafted a three-year plan for launch. This plan includes various metrics (for measuring success and evaluating progress), goals and responsibilities for each campus, and a firm launch date of no later than July 1,

2022. (See details in Pastor Abi's article) To some of you, that date may feel like it's a long time from now. For others of you, that date may seem very soon. The reality is, it's a goal that will force Haymarket Church to stretch further and push harder than we ever have before, while also allowing time for the growth that's necessary in order to make this launch happen. For Haymarket Church to reach this goal, we will have to grow – spiritually, administratively, financially, in our worship attendance, and more. We believe that such growth is possible – God has surrounded us with all sorts of incredible opportunities – and this plan gives us time to take advantage of those opportunities and take our next steps forward.

We are excited about these next steps that God has put in front of us. We are thankful for where God has taken us—and for the support and encouragement we have received from the Manassas Campus of St. Thomas that is helping to launch us towards this goal. There is a lot of hard work ahead of us over the next few years, but there is also unimaginable possibility. God is doing something new and exciting at Haymarket Church. Thank you so much to all the people of St. Thomas who continue to support this project. We are seeing lives transformed, people come to know Jesus, and God's love being put into action. Your support is helping to make that possible, and, together, God is using us to bring something new to life. Pray for us (we are praying for you!). We are looking forward to seeing where God takes us next!

## **SPARK Prayer Tour**

The SPARK team recently participated in a Prayer Tour to explore the community surrounding St. Thomas. We paid attention to

the people, the homes they live in, and the environment in general. We travelled to four specific areas of Manassas that have concentrated members of four different demographic groups that most closely align with the demographics of our church. It was an interesting exercise - we were actually taking the time to physically explore the details of the environment surrounding those we serve or endeavor to serve. It was exciting to answer the question, "Who do we serve?" with firsthand data rather than educated guesses.

As we entered each neighborhood, we paid attention to who we saw, their ages, nationalities, the languages spoken and on signs. We looked at the homes, what kind of architecture was there, how close together they were to each other. We looked at the businesses in the area along with the schools and churches. We stopped in each neighborhood and prayed together. Along the way, the members of the SPARK team discussed the benefits and challenges that were faced in each neighborhood. We shared stories about our own experiences in these neighborhoods. Many of us have lived in at least one, if not all, of the areas. We examined the differences between the areas and discussed how those differences would change effective ministry.

During the tour, we shared a meal together and discussed how what we learned could be integrated into a plan for the church. We also visited one of the churches in the area, observed how it reached out to the community and contemplated similarities and differences with St. Thomas. The SPARK meetings and discussions have been very emotional and spiritual. I am thankful that Abi and Ron have encouraged us to experience actual realities like those witnessed during the Prayer Tour instead of hypothetical realities based on census data or assumptions. I have lived in Manassas for fifty years and this is the first time I have whole heartedly looked upon it with the attitude of a disciple.

You can't make a kid love God, have faith, or care about what matters... but there are things you can give them over time that make a difference in their lives. I wonder, do you believe that what we do for the children and youth in our lives matters? I believe wholeheartedly that what we do matters to God and it matters to the next generation. We should feel obligated, because we were all kids once. And, if we're part of the human race, then we are expected to take care of our young. But, sometimes, investing in our children and grand-children can make us feel like we're losing our marbles! This fall in worship we'll be exploring what every kid needs to not only thrive but to • have a faith that lasts a lifetime. This series is not just for • parents, grand-parents, and families but for all of us who are interested in the lives of the next generation and . building a better future together.

In the only psalm that Moses wrote, he gave us this verse, "Teach us to count our days that we may gain a wise heart." (Psalm 90:12, NRSV) As you imagine counting our days, consider a jar full of marbles. Each marble represents one week. If you start with the day we are born, and put in one marble for the first eighteen years of our life, you end up with a jar full of 936 marbles (52 weeks for 18 years).

Were we to start with 936 marbles in a jar when a child is born, and then take one marble out each week of that child's life, we would end up with jar half empty at age 9, and completely gone at age 18. Each week, we would watch as the time passes by, the marbles disappear. Week by week, we are losing our marbles. We are losing the opportunity we have to influence the life of that child.

So, what is best for us to do, before we lose all our marbles? There are some things we may never be able to do. We may never be able to persuade a toddler to enjoy

Brussels sprouts. We may not be able to prevent a teenager from seeking independence. But there are some important things we are able to give our children (and one another of any age), to let them know why their life matters to God.

Reggie Joiner, founder of the "Think Orange" movement, has written a book called Playing for Keeps, Losing Your Marbles (Orange Publishing, 2013). He offers six specific gifts we can give children, over time, which make a significant impact on their lives. He says, (1) "It takes time, over time, to make a history worth repeating." (2) "Love, over time, is the one thing that matters most." (3) "Words, over time, can impact someone's direction in life." (4) "Stories, over time, move us to imagine a world beyond ourselves." (5) "Tribes, over time, show us how we belong." (6) "Fun, over time, makes a friendship go deeper."

Our fall sermon series will explore these six gifts, and how we can share these gifts with one another, as parents, as mentors, as friends, as Christians. Here is the schedule:

- Aug. 25, "Time Matters" (Psalm 90; Ephesians 5:15-20)
- Sept. 1, "Love Matters" (1 John 4:7-12), Communion
- Sept. 8, "Words Matter" (Proverbs 15:1-4), Bring-a-Friend (BFF) Sunday
- Sept. 15, "Stories Matter" (Deuteronomy 26:1-11)
- Sept. 22, "Tribes Matter" (Acts 2:42-47)
- Sept. 29, "Fun Matters" (Luke 15:11-32)




We had a great time playing Laser Tag after VBS in July! All teens 6th-12th grade are always welcome to participate.
