- 1. What is the most beautiful place on earth that you've experienced? Read Psalm 104, and consider what part of nature interests you most?
- 2. What three fruits of the earth are mentioned in Psalm 104:15? How have these become enduring religious symbols?
- 3. What beauty captures your attention on a regular basis and how do you linger with it? What is the ultimate purpose of creation according to Psalm 104 (look at v. 31)?
- 4. To what places do you go that engage you with beauty in an extra-ordinary way? What is it about such places that speak to your soul?
- 5. Is there a particular type of music or art that speaks to your soul and gives it flight?
- 6. Where and when is beauty embraced in our congregational life together?
- 7. Where and when do you experience beauty beyond your particular culture?
- 8. What are your responses to beauty that do not appeal to you? This week as you pray, begin to release these responses to God so that you might discover more beauty throughout God's creation.
- 9. Reread 1 Corinthians 12:12 14. Why is verse 12 such a good illustration of verse 13? How do these verses make you feel about your place in the body of Christ? About your need for others in worship and our church community as a beautiful part of God's creation?

2. Beauty is reality seen through the eyes of ______.

ACTIONS TO CONSIDER

- 1. **Be more attentive and mindful of your surroundings**. Really look at the world around you to see more clearly, to fall in love more deeply.
- 2. **Linger or tarry with people**. Spend time and rest awhile.
- 3. Give and receive hospitality.
- 4. Serve as an advocate when beauty is marred or destroyed.

BOTTOM LINE:

When our sense of beauty is polluted by the harshness of life, we worship in order to recalibrate our lives with God's sense of beauty. We **need worship** to help us practice seeing and responding to the beauty of God's creation with love.
